# Cut to the quick: She wants to help

LOVELAND - The long and short of Loveland wanted to help a family the way her's had been helped.

So on March 24, she jumped up into a swivel chair at Loveland Hair Designers on Loveland-Madeira Road and allowed stylist Karla Gannaway to snip off more than 10 inches of her thick brown hair.

With the cut, Mulhollen raised more than \$1,000 for a non-profit organization that helps couples defray the cost of fertility procedures at The Christ Hospital.

The downtown Cincinnati charity is called The Madeleine Gordon Gift of Life Foundation, and Mulhollen is the first child ever to be born as a result of its efforts.

"I feel really glad I'm doing this," said Mulhollen, a fifth-grader at Loveland Intermediate School who raised the money by securing sponsors, much like a walk-a-thon participant.

"You'd think I'd feel scared, but I'm not," she said.

"I know I'm helping out other children and parents in need."

One reason Mulhollen was not of it is, 10-year-old Katie Mulhollen nervous is that she's done this before - and with Gannaway.

> Like last time, the hair Mulhollen cut off March 24 will be sent to Locks of Love of Lake in Worth, Fla., a nonprofit organization that provides hairpieces to financially disadvantaged children suffering from long-term hair loss caused by a medical malady.

> Mulhollen's parents, Tina and John Mulhollen, were on hand to support their daughter while Gannaway cut her hair and deftly shaped it into a fresh, contemporary hairdo.
